Dear Holy Trinity family,

'Got a vocation, anybody? *Vocation* literally means calling – in "church speak" it's God who's doing the calling.

When I was a child in parochial school, our teachers urged us to "Pray for vocations." In the 1960's that meant, "Pray for people to hear God calling them to be priests or sisters." There was (and still is) a shortage of clergy and "religious" – folks who become ordained and/or join religious communities, promising to remain celibate, to be obedient to a superior, and sometimes to take a vow of poverty.

Martin Luther had an amazing insight "way back when" in the early 1500's: **every** Christian has a vocation! At every baptism the assisting minister invites the congregation, "Let us welcome the newly baptized":

We welcome you into the Body of Christ and into the mission we share: join us in giving thanks and praise to God and bearing God's creative and redeeming word to all the world.¹

I think of it as a reminder that the person who's just been baptized has received working papers for the Kingdom of God! When we baptize a baby or a small child, the parents and family already have a sense of the little person's personality, but not of the inborn talents God has given. But whether that newly minted Christian grows up to be an assembly line worker or a heart surgeon, God has assigned holy work to be done: to love God above all else and neighbor as self! The bar is set high for "Love thy neighbor," since Jesus specifically has commanded: "Love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34)

It's easier for us to identify "church work" as a vocation, whether it's being a pastor, directing or singing in the choir, visiting the sick as a representative of our faith family, serving as an assisting minister or usher, setting the altar before worship and taking care of the elements of Holy Communion afterwards, teaching Sunday School, overseeing church finances, welcoming new members, collecting food for the hungry, raising funds for the social services that care for the homeless or impoverished, making sure the heat is working in the winter and the air conditioning in the summer.

A career in health care is easily recognized as an extension of Jesus' role as Great Physician, right? Doctor, physician's assistant, nurse practitioner, physical and occupational

therapist, audiologist, nurse, phlebotomist, medical technologist, health care aide, EMT, paramedic, counselor: all are clearly human channels of Heaven's healing grace. Jesus wasn't just a healer, He was a teacher, too, so no matter what subject someone teaches, you have a holy vocation of imparting knowledge to make lives richer, whether you're working with the "gifted and talented" kids or those with special needs. Whether you're a college prof, a preschool teacher, or anything in-between, you're called to teach with integrity and

with compassion as well as with wisdom. As with coaching and Scouting or 4 H leadership, you're teaching by example who your students are to be and not just what they are to do. You're helping to shape a person and not just impart subject matter.

What if you're an accountant, an engineer, a lawyer, a financial advisor, a supervisor, an architect or a government worker? What if you're in law enforcement, or are a probation officer, store clerk, office worker, table server, airline attendant, stylist, telemarketer, musician, artist, construction worker, someone who works in environmental services or sanitation? Our overarching vocation is the same, regardless of where we punch a time clock or pick up a paycheck: we are to love God above all else and our neighbors as ourselves! We are to obey the commandments: to be honest, trustworthy, loyal, bringing our full attention and devotion to whatever work we are called to do.

Martin Luther said quite clearly that parenting is also a holy vocation. He wrote:

But the greatest good in married life, that which makes all suffering and labor worth while, is that God grants offspring and commands that they be brought up to worship and serve him. In all the world this is the noblest and most precious work, because to God there can be nothing dearer than the salvation of souls...

Most certainly father and mother are apostles, bishops, and priests to their children, for it is they who make them acquainted with the gospel. (Luther's Works 45:46)²

Luther made this point especially strongly to counter the prevailing belief that anyone who vowed to be celibate and to forgo having a family would be several rungs up the ladder of salvation that 16^{th} century Christians imagined had to be climbed.

I love Frederick Buechner's definition of vocation: "the place where 'your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." ³ Some of us are blessed to be in professions that allow us to do what we love. What gives us joy also fills the world's need. That is a gift and a privilege not to be taken lightly. Some of us, out of necessity, earn a paycheck in a job that is less than satisfying. Regardless: we **all** have a 7-day-a-week vocation from God to live a life of faith, hope and love.

'Know anybody who's got a vocation? I do, and it's you!

Blessings Seen or Heard By Peter Seggel

It's raining. I had hoped to squeeze in a gentle walk/jog before tackling everything else. My house feels vacant. Some children and grandchildren spent the entire summer or lengthened weekends. One son, having had Fort Dix as a duty station, had returned home for the last several years, a particular blessing for my wife and me. All of them have packed up and have begun a new period of their lives. Those relatively close by seem suddenly far away.

Some of my most esteemed friends at Holy Trinity have serious health problems. Several have died, gone to be with the Lord. Others have been nearly overwhelmed by challenges of a different kind.

I don't want to sound like I'm grumbling. I am not. I certainly don't want to be like the grumbling Israelites in the desert wilderness that drove Moses to dark despair and whom God felt needed an extra 40 years to learn to trust him.

Perhaps the real blessing of this season is that the Lord God has been at work among us. Have you noticed He has been working with and through his church? At hard beginnings and earthly endings, during gray days and periods of painful losses, be it of loved ones or one's own identity, God has been seeking to instill within us a progressing, revived, and recommitted faith.

I don't know the exact number of memorial services over which Pastor Mary has presided. A lot! I do know that in a recent eight day stretch she has comforted, encouraged, invited, persuaded, and taught at four memorial services. There was no hint of tedium or weariness. Instead, we had a shepherdess chosen by the Good Shepherd using the poetry of her prose fully intent on making sure everyone heard the hope that comes only because Jesus is the Resurrection and Life. Her steadfast love and faith was visible. At one service, a large family procession accompanied the casket to the altar. After Pastor Mary finished the welcoming words, she realized that group had not received bulletins. She hastened to find extras from Fellowship Hall and then personally went down to hand them out before stepping up into the pulpit. I wrote in my bulletin, "Pastor Mary, Ever the servant. Like Jesus washing feet." A humble act of love, but an observable blessing indeed.

Yet the blessing of those memorial services was the whole group of the faithful and trusting serving as ushers, communion assistants, musicians, readers. Comforters in numbers. All are evidence of the power of faith and Christ's real presence. A particular gift was the repast made possible through Holy Trinity's own special group of dedicated workers we call "Care Core." All present became a lasting blessing much appreciated by each other. Holy Trinity is a place of friends and impactful memories. Thank you for shining with the light of Christ and pushing back the darkness. What joy it is to be together with you.

Here is further evidence of God's faith-building efforts at Holy Trinity.

This summer a small group of us took the opportunity to finish through chapter 12, that part of John's Gospel often described as "Book of Signs." Out of the hundreds, if not thousands of signs Jesus did, John chose seven. We explored their meaning diving deeply into their Old Testament roots and the context in Jesus' days on earth. John combined the signs with Jesus' conversations with people like Nicodemus and the Samaritan woman and introduced several "I AM" statements. John clearly and succinctly claims "these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God and that believing you may have life in his name." (John 20:30-31 ESV). The watchword of our group was "Behold," meaning to look harder, more carefully, to recognize that there is more there than what meets the eye. The more we looked, the more we believed that John's writing, its content and literary design, was spectacularly inspired by the Holy Spirit. How then could we not believe and trust our Lord Jesus ever more strongly? I am grateful for the group who spent eight weeks together. Their interest pushed us to learn so much more.

> "Behold, God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid; for the Lord God is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation." (Isaiah 12:2 ESV)

Come, your presence at Holy Trinity will be blessed by our faith inspiring Lord.


We're thrilled to share the theme for the 2024 ELCA Youth Gathering:

Furniture Bank Report for Sept/Oct Nothing Fits Anywhere!



This past week has been a study in patience and impossibility. More or less, nothing fits anywhere! But, I'm getting ahead of myself. You've probably heard the expression, "where there's a will there's a way." After our bed pickup in June, I would amend that to "where there's a will there's a Wolf!" Why? A bed was donated to the Furniture Bank. It was on the 2nd floor. I have no idea how they got it in there, (maybe built the house around it), but it was clear that the box spring was never going down their spiral staircase. Mattresses are flexible. Box springs are not. But, Wolf had an idea. We could put straps around the box spring and lower it over the railing directly into The Hammer. See photos. It worked!!

Most of our issues are not with removing donated furniture; they are with getting the furniture into the client's apartment. I'm sure there are building codes for the width of doors in residences. Whatever they are, I guess it only applies to new construction which, of course, is not what we're dealing with. In my opinion, either the law should re-

quire wider doors, or smaller furniture. Oh, and there should also be a rule that if you have a high rise senior residence building, you must have an elevator big enough to hold a sofa. How are they supposed to get furniture up there?


On Saturday, we delivered a sectional to client who had a studio apartment. I tried to talk him out of it, but he was sure it would fit. I estimate that the room was about 12'x12'. What he neglected to mention was that it was on the 3rd floor. Nevertheless, the client and Wolf carried the largest part up the stairs where (as expected), it wouldn't fit through his 29" door. See photo of sectional stuck in the door below. In the end, we took the door off and got it inside.



On Monday, we took a nice sofa to a senior building in Long Branch. There were people there who were to take it inside. While we went back to pick up a mattress, they tried. It didn't fit in the elevator and although they tried to take it up the stairs, she was on the 9th floor. When we returned with the mattress, we picked up the sofa and took it back to our storage area!

Later the same day, we took another sofa to a client in Asbury. He and his 6 kids had an apartment in a house. His front door was down the hall behind the stairwell. The hallway was only 29" wide, which was already too narrow, and the apartment door -- 25". We couldn't even get the arm chair down the hall. We had to hoist it over a fence onto the back porch.

Then on Wednesday, we attempted to deliver a sofa and love seat to another apartment in Asbury Park. Of course it wouldn't go through the door and the legs weren't the type that easily come off. While we were trying to get the door off, we heard a big crash. Someone sideswiped Zorro parked at the curb. I'm not happy that his beautiful left side had been scraped off (including the mirror), but worse was that apparently the tie-rod broke. Not that I know what a tie-rod is, but Wolf said he couldn't steer! We are waiting for the adjuster to take a look. Meanwhile, we expect that not having Zorro will really hinder our productivity.





<u>UPDATES AND COMING EVENTS FROM THE JUSTICE AND PEACE ADVOCACY TEAM</u>

While we had no official meeting during the month of July, that didn't mean we were idle. We hosted a summer social at the Clubhouse in Barclay Woods on July 13 where 24 of our members, family, and friends gathered to enjoy an evening of appetizers, desserts, and libations. The evening was marked by wonderful fellowship, animated conversations, and a great deal of fun!

The Care for Creation group conducted a Wraps and Rap on Saturday evening, July 22 which attracted approximately 30 attendees to view a documentary

about the Wine to Water organization. Having raised over \$1,000 to purchase water filters, those present assembled enough filters to provide a year's worth of clean water for 300 people in need. Given that many of us who attended enjoyed the wine that was served, assembling the filters was no small feat but, nevertheless, we perservered.

On July 25, several of our Justice and Peace team attended a Social Sips event at the Watermark in Asbury Park in support of the Trinity Center for Community. Approximately 140 folks gathered to celebrate the organization and the impact that they are having in southern Monmouth County.

Once again, Holy Trinity is fielding a team to ride in the Bike Ride for Food Justice which will be held on September 9 at Trinity Episcopal in Asbury Park. Under the banner of "God's Work, Our Wheels", our team captain Susan Ardito will be leading us in an effort to raise funds for the many ministries at Trinity that provide food and shelter where the need is great. Our goal is to duplicate the \$6,000 contribution we were able to make last year. For those from our HT faith family who are not bikers, you can still make a contribution during the Justice and Peace sponsored coffee hour on Sunday, September 17.

Our Immigration and Refugee subcommittee will be hosting a coffee hour on October 29 to continue their focus on that topic. Proceeds will go toward helping support Rosy Pablo Cruz who was the author of the book which we read last fall. She and her children have been granted asylum after their harrowing trek from Guatemala.

Finally, this fall we will begin planning for our study on gun violence which will be offered in 2024. This will be an ecumenical effort which will include, at a minimum, our Justice and Peace Committee, the Manasquan Quakers, and representatives from Trinity Episcopal. Stay tuned for more information.

School superintendent, Donna Dreibelbis (sundayschool@holytrinity-elca.org), if the Holy Spirit is tugging on your heart! 
