

Pastor's Pen



Dear Holy Trinity family,

Have you ever been in worship when there was a really loud crash of thunder or a blindingly-bright flash of lightening at a significant moment? Maybe the Scripture was about judgment or there was a pregnant pause in the sermon or we'd just prayed, "Our Father, who art in Heaven," and it seemed like the drama of thunder and lightening signaled God's entrance into the sanctuary. "You have our full attention, Lord! We're ready to listen!" Years ago Bishop Roy Riley was preaching at a Holy Trinity festival liturgy that included torchbearers and crucifer. One of our torchbearers was a newbee and didn't quite latch the torch into its holder fully. As we sang the processional hymn I reached the presider's bench, from which I could see her post the torch and step away. (At that time the torches were attached to the lectern, not the pulpit.) As if in slow motion I saw the torch begin to fall and then hit the floor, complete with the shattering of the glass cylinder protecting the flame. (Murphy's Law: it happened the day the bishop was visiting!) "You have our full attention, Lord! We're ready to listen!"

Pastor Mark & I attended the Quaker Meeting on the Manasquan Circle on Friday evening, Nov. 10. The candlelit Prayer Vigil for Peace in the Mideast began with silent prayer inside the meetinghouse. Have you ever visited that historic building? Many people assume it is a museum, but it is not; it is a living house of worship. The Quakers are the oldest faith community at the Shore; they have had title to that property since 1685! The current building is the third on the site; it dates from 1884. Like our own historic sanctuary, it has been seasoned with the prayers of the faithful for well over 100 years.... We began worship by singing "This Is My Song" (beautiful peace hymn set to Sibelius' Finlandia), then settled into quiet meditation for about 20 minutes. The Quaker silence (to which we Lutherans are greatly unaccustomed!) was broken only by a couple brief spontaneous sharings – and at one point a bit of bustle outside, muffled voices, and the closing of interior doors to the meeting room. At the end of prayer time, our Friend explained what had caused the minor hubbub: the front door had fallen off! (Our own HT Property Committee can commiserate over the challenges of upkeep for a very old building!) "You have our full attention, Lord! We're ready to listen!'



When something really bizarre happens, I sometimes remember to ask, "What are You getting at, Lord? What am I supposed to notice? What are You aiming to

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teach me?" I was on somebody's else's "turf" so didn't have to problem-solve about the door on the ground. My brainwaves were left free to play with the weird detachment of the door. What I came up with was: such a lovely metaphor for openness!! "Come one, come all! You don't need a password for entry. You don't need a key to unlock the door. You don't have to be able to turn a doorknob or heave a heavy door open. Walk right in! You are welcome!"

Church friends who have been part of Holy Trinity for a long time say we used to be called, "The Church of the Open Door." The sanctuary door was never locked. Folks could drop in and pray at any hour of the day or night. That changed when something was stolen from the sanctuary. (Bookstand on the altar? Pulpit Bible? I'm not sure.) I'm not suggesting we literally go back to unlocked doors, 'round the clock. But I do hope we'll keep in mind the fanciful image of God taking the Friends' door off its hinges! I do hope we'll ask, "What are the barriers preventing those who are outside from coming inside?" God isn't finished with us yet! As a Church of the Reformation, we continually remind ourselves that we are **always** in need of reform, and that the Holy Spirit is **always** wanting to do a brand new thing among us. As Church we exist for those who are not here yet. We have received the treasure of the Gospel to **share**, not to **hoard**. We're not like pioneers who need to circle the wagons to protect ourselves from outside attack. If we form a circle, it's a circle of care – there is always a way into the circle – and some in the circle are always focused outward, to beckon others in and to report back on the needs of the world around us.

My favorite quote-of-the-week comes from Dorothy Day, 20th century social reformer:


We have all known the long loneliness and we have learned that the only solution is love and that love comes with community.

We are richly blessed with community, a faith family with whom to give thanks, to make Advent preparations, to celebrate Christmas, to serve in time-honored and totally new ways in the new year. "You have our full attention, Lord! We're ready to listen!" May we live more faithfully and share more generously with each passing day, season and year.



St. Paul's epistles, his letters, usually start with the format identifying the sender, then the recipients, then a greeting, e.g. "Grace and Peace," followed often by a thanksgiving, an expression of gratitude. Here are some expressions of gratitude. The weekend of October 21-22 was a busy time. Pastor Mary was away with a large group of women on the annual retreat. I have heard from some who have been before, that they believe this was the best ever. However, that didn't mean that things stopped at Holy Trinity. I received this message from Barbara Vogel:

"I know this is last minute but I had an idea. Watch out!! This weekend is the women's retreat and I noticed there is no coffee hour scheduled for Sunday. What if the men held a coffee hour and showed HT what they can do? If this works for you, can you get 5-6 men to bring something (homemade or bakery) to share? I know Ken Olsen will pick up doughnuts if you ask. Someone could bring bagels. Buzz makes fabulous sticky buns. I have a stash of coffee and there is plenty of milk, 1/2 & 1/2, butter, cream cheese, paper products. There could be a donation basket to donate to the Rescue Mission or something else you choose. I will set it up and help with cleanup. Let me know!"

Result: abundant contributions of delicious food from the men who did show what they could do (thank you!), enjoyable fellowship and conversation, the joy of doing something together, and a nice donation that will go to Alzheimer's New Jersey.

Alzheimer's New Jersey has been a good resource for me to learn about Alzheimer's and other dementias. Every time I have called with a question, I have found them to be an inspiring resource. Even if you are not personally providing care for persons with dementia in your own immediate family, you will have friends who are daily responding to varied and constantly changing challenges. You can find help by going to their website, alznj.org. You will find they have a helpful webinar library and host webinars. A current series, Preparation, Planning and Peace of Mind: Legal and Financial Considerations for Individuals with Dementia has already started, but there will be two new live webinars: November 15th, 6 p.m.: Rights of Long-Term Care Residents; November 29th, 6 p.m.: Advanced Care Planning in Alzheimer's Disease. There is also a helpline and their weekly update always has something useful. You should sign up for it.

On the same subject, there is a support group that meets every third Monday, 5-7 p.m. at the Manasquan United Methodist Church. Several Holy Trinity members who have attended found it remarkably informative and helpful. No sign up necessary – just go. Some people come with a friend. If you are hesitant or have questions, please call me – anytime. I would like to thank our group of Stephen Ministers, who enabled another Caregivers' Conversation on that same Sunday – the 22nd. I am grateful for those who take the opportunity to tell their stories. It is a healthy thing to do. And our Stephen ministers are not only good listeners but have powerful insights from their own life experiences. They are a blessing. They evidence the truth of God's loving presence for us. Psalm 46 begins, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Our conversation concluded with thoughts about how Stephen Ministry might be the refuge God provides. It seems that many who have embraced the role of caregiver in their households reach moments when they are nearly overwhelmed. They need a breather, a respite, a short change of scenery, a chance to walk outside and around the block, take a look at the ocean, come to Bible study or be in a different space. We are wondering how it would work if we made ourselves available to such a person at that time. Maybe one of us could come over soon or plan a visit to give the person time for regrouping before they are overwhelmed. In that way, with the Lord's help, we might be a timely refuge. As we begin the experiment, do not hesitate to give me a call; either I or another Stephen minister will try to help out. The most necessary component is that you call.

This past Sunday during the 5th and 6th grade Sunday School class, I was overjoyed by how the class has progressed. There were six children who really engaged the subject. Where often there had been six blank faces, eyes looking down, they are all speaking up, eager to participate, volunteering an answer or thought. They are more willing to read out loud. They remember what has been taught previously. I thank the Lord for bringing Mrs. Randi Molinelli into this classroom. Randi has sparked their conversation. For example, she has made a set of cards with key words or names from the last Bible stories from Luke 1. These are handed out to the students, and when it is their turn, they describe the importance or role of the words or names to the story. It is very hopeful. And fun.

Here are some other blessings for which you should be watchful.

The Youtherans – high-school youth group – I caught them at a Wednesday evening dinner gathering. Their smiles were radiant. Ned has been show-casing his cooking skills. A fun time at HT.

Our joint Bible study with St. Denis is a wonderful gathering of Christians with two extraordinary teachers – we are looking at the lectionary for the week to come. If I could, I would go to both – the people in each are different and have a different thoughts, but all are worth getting to know. Don't miss out!

Observed young high-school singers in choir – often their parents attend church.

Observe – and listen - the bells were played on Sunday. It really sounded nice. The group has become more than individuals playing their bells, but a musical ensemble multiplying the loveliness of the music making each other sound wonderful.

Be around Holy Trinity, keep your eyes and ears open, and you will be blessed.





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JUSTICE AND PEACE ADVOCACY TEAM



A highlight of the fall was our work to raise funds for the Bike Ride for Food Justice, an event sponsored annually by Trinity Episcopal Church in Asbury Park. Thanks to our bike-riding team (spearheaded by Susan Ardito), sponsors, and coffee hour donations, we successfully brought in close to \$4,000, monies that will be used to support Trinity's food and housing ministries in an area where it is most needed.

Another highpoint was the generous donation raised during the coffee hour for Rosy Pablo Cruz and her four children, hosted by our Immigration and Refugee subcommittee. A grateful "thank you" to all who contributed. Rosy visited Holy Trinity last year to tell about her grueling journey as a refugee from Guatemala, and the hardships she endured after being separated from her two sons at the border, a story vividly told in the book "Rosy". She now lives in the Bronx in a one-bedroom apartment with her sons and two daughters, who were finally granted visas. We will continue to support Rosy through the asylum process. Her journey of faith has been a source of hope and inspiration for all of us.

The Caring for Creation subcommittee is supporting the Manasquan High School (MHS) Gardening Club in the NexTrex Plastic Recycling Challenge, designed to help students understand the importance of recycling and the need to reduce waste. We have already delivered two carloads of plastic to MHS, whose goal is to raise 1,000 pounds of recyclables. The program will be ongoing for the next several months. The bin for recyclables is located in Fellowship Hall on the right side of the stage.

Looking forward to next year, we are already forging alliances and meeting with local church ministries as part of our Ecumenical Program on Gun Violence, which will be a major focus for Justice and Peace in 2024. We believe by partnering with other churches and organizations that have existing gun violence programs, we can be most effective in our efforts. In January, we will review ideas and topics for next year's "deep dives," examining our subcommittees to determine which programs offered in the past particularly engaged our faith family in the education and advocacy of today's relevant justice and peace issues, especially as they relate to our local community.

Furniture Bank Surpasses 2000!!!

We met Mary Ellen through Raisa Acevedo of HabCore. HabCore helps homeless and other disadvantaged people find housing (see HabCore.org). They helped Mary Ellen find a room and we helped her with some furniture. She had spent the last five months living in the woods. She shared some of her story with us. She told me that she had been homeless before and lived in her car with her son. She did have a job, but there was some issue with her identification. Apparently she could not provide a valid ID card. She grew up in a town in NY, but didn't realize that she wasn't actually born there and had so far not been able to get a copy of her birth certificate. She told us that there were many people living in the woods who had been there much longer than her, but she said all she wanted was a room with a bathroom and a place to cook.





I wanted to give you an update on Zorro's condition. As of our last newsletter, we were waiting for an insurance adjustor to take a look. Their report detailed every nick, scratch, bump and bruise that Zorro has experienced over his 20 years, but failed to mention anything mechanical like the broken tie-rod which was the reason we couldn't drive him. I guess they just stopped counting when the damage exceeded what they said the value was. Miraculously, they decided that a 20 year old Ford Ranger with damage to its right side, a swiped off left side including a demolished mirror and 146,000 miles was worth just over \$8000. They asked me if I would accept that as payment. It was a tough decision!!!!!! I told them I wanted to buy him back. The accident happened on a Wednesday. By the following Tuesday, I had the truck and a check for \$7497. By Thursday, Zorro was back on

the road. **Zorro lives again!!!** Of course, the body has a bunch of dents, and the mirrors don't match, but the tierods are fixed and he passed inspection. They were unable to find a mirror to match the old one, and I opted to have a new one and an old one. So they look a little different. Who cares?? It adds more personality.

You may wonder what's happening in the photo below. Ever hear the expression, "When the cat's away the mice will play?" This is a Furni-

They were actually waiting for me to finish texting our latest donor.

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The Fall season is always the busiest for the Social Ministry team. We had a successful Nearly New Clothing Sale



and bake sale that took in over \$4350 which went to Maui relief and the Manasquan Food Pantry. All left over clothing was donated to local charities who pass it on to those in need. Goodies were sold, locals got great buys on clothing and clothing was kept out of landfills. A great deal of work and many hours setting up and folding clothes but definitely a win/win.



Our next project was the Thanksgiving food drive for the Manasquan Food Pantry. Our generous congregation donated 109 bags of food totaling 867 pounds. The Jersey Shore University Medical Center ER donated 92 bags with 710 pounds of food. Thank you to Lauren Navarro who started this project with the hospital ER several years ago. Apparently this has reached

Financial NE is also providing \$500 in grant money for the second year in a row.

Our Christmas Angel tree is going up November 18th with ornaments to provide gifts for Madonna House in Neptune, ELCA Good Gifts and local families. Gifts are due back December 10th in order to get them back to Madonna House for organization and distribution the following week. Gifts should not be wrapped and you can choose the item/items you would like to donate from the list from Madonna House posted by the tree.





Have you seen the coat rack in Fellowship Hall that will be there into January? 28 coats have already gone to the Jersey Shore Rescue Mission for their Coat Giveaway on Saturday, November 18. All other coats will be distributed to local charities providing coats for those in need. If you have outgrown a coat or received a new one for Christmas please share what you are no longer using. Scarves, hats and gloves also needed.

Christmas cards for the homebound are being prepared to be mailed or for Peter to deliver on his visits. We want to ensure those who are not able to attend church in person know they are not forgotten especially during the Christmas season.

These projects would not be successful without the continuing support from all of you. Our church family is always so generous with their time and donations and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts. These are trying times for many and our mission is to help as many people as possible with our support of food, clothing and money where needed.

And help us to remember that the key to life and living Is to make each prayer a prayer of thanks and everyday Thanksgiving.



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Sept. 2-3 - Thank you, Social Ministry friends, for inviting our faith family's generosity toward those in need! Lunch Break's Family Promise provides shelter for temporarily homeless families in hotels, providing services for 16 weeks to get them on their feet and hopefully in housing. Social Ministry donated \$200 to Family Promise for the swim day they provided for the families. Summer events were held every other week to get the families out of their hotel for some summer fun. The funds covered the cost of \$8/person to swim, plus snacks. Lunch Break is the parent community that provides food,

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clothing, life skills and fellowship to those in need in Monmouth County and beyond. The following is an excerpt from a thank you letter we received: "By generously supporting Lunch Break, your contributions allow us to advance our mission to provide Help for Today and Hope for Tomorrow. Thank you for your kindness and compassion."

Sept. 9-10: Solos, duets, small groups, summer choir, and the boisterous voices of the congregation have filled the sanctuary with music all summer long. Thank you to all who go above and be yond to beautify and enrich worship through music during these summer months.

Sept. 16-17: We thank Katie & Bob Pacholski for donating their wedding flowers for weekend worship. We give thanks to everyone who has given or plan to give flowers to the glory of God and in celebration of life events or in memory of loved ones. Florist's arrangements are lovely but if you enjoy flower arranging there is always the option to create your own beautiful bouquets!

Sept. 23-24: Thank you to all who made the Jersey Shore Bike Ride for Food Justice a huge success by riding or contributing to Holy Trinity's cyclists. We raised ~\$4000 dollars from pledges to our team and from the September 17th coffee hour. The event total was ~\$75,000 this year, just a bit less than 2022. The funds will be used to support food and housing ministries at Trinity Church in Asbury Park, where the need for food and shelter is highest in our area. Trinity Church serves over 35,000 meals each year and operates a food pantry. We are in partnership with them to feed the hungry, and also to address the root cause of poverty and homelessness at the Jersey Shore. May God bless you for your generosity and concern for your brothers and sisters in need.

Jimmy Savaryn Meets the Mitchells

This past week, I had the pleasure of interviewing Heidi and Scott Mitchell, a missionary couple who were stopping in New Jersey, on vacation from their missionary work in Kenya, to visit family and thank their financial and spiritual supporters. It just so happens that Heidi and Scott are Pastor Mark's daughter and son-in-law! Their excursion to Kenya wasn't exactly a vacation, either: they left everything they owned behind, only bringing suitcases and their children with them! They shared some insight into how they became missionaries, and what it is like to work in Kenya. Scott admitted, at first, he did not want to be a missionary. He was a high school teacher in PA, and he was comfortable with his job and really felt he was needed there. Heidi was a teacher at an elementary school, and worked part time at their church after their children were born. However, she felt that something was missing, and that she could fill that gap by becoming a missionary. She stated that missionary work kept coming to her mind but had no idea where it would take her. She believed she would remain somewhere in the United States. Since she and Scott were not on the same page at that point regarding missionary work, the two prayed on it for a long time, and two years later, Scott said, "I woke up and was finally ready". Scott noted that he spoke to friends about it and also to a Missions Pastor. The Pastor told him that they could not do mission work if only one of them felt the call. Scott read books for missionaries and took a trip with his son and their home church to the Dominican Republic. While on the trip he spoke to another parent who suggested he work for Rift Valley Academy in Kenya. After going through a lengthy hiring process,

the two were accepted to work at Rift Valley Academy in Kenya. Scott said his good-

byes to his high school, and Heidi to her job at the church, and the family sold every-

thing they didn't need (like their house and car), and moved to Kenya. For some

background, They are both teachers and mentors to the kids that attend Rift Valley

Academy. They had a home on the campus but were later asked to become dorm par-

ents and moved into a part of the dorm.

The two of them now supervise the dorms of the high school boys. This includes greeting them in the morning, making sure they are back by curfew, and having fun with them by playing games together; all the normal things teenage boys do. If I learned one thing from this interview, it's that kids are kids everywhere. The kids in Kenya are just normal, average highschoolers that just happen to live at their school, almost like college except at a younger age and with more supervision. They have the same struggles and successes as I might in my studies or personal life. It's hard to imagine living in a place where wild monkeys can break into your home (Heidi said they go for the chocolate and eggs) but that regional difference is one of the only things Rift Valley Academy has that is different from my high school. Another thing I learned from this interview is that ordinary people are special. Scott considered himself a normal teacher in PA, until his trip to Kenya. It was then that he realized that God uses everyday, average people to do his work. People aren't just born to become missionaries, they have a calling or a gut feeling that tells them to do so. Scott recommended to me that people should listen for God's calling, because it will make them happy. In conclusion, if you've been wanting to do something for a while, and you feel that it is what God has called you to do, go do it! It may seem scary, but remember Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me".
